Kansas Legislative Report

April 28, 2023

The 2023 Legislative Session is officially in the books after legislators returned to Topeka for a three day veto session to consider veto overrides and wrap up lingering items. During the April break, Governor Kelly vetoed fifteen bills, plus a series of budget line-item vetoes.

By Friday evening, the House and Senate wrapped up business for the veto session, ending the session, including the procedural Sine Die.

The week saw steady momentum and ultimate approval of a final omnibus budget, including a school funding bill and a handful of conference committee reports.

Of the Governor's fifteen vetoes of policy bills, the Legislature successfully voted to override eight of them with seven sustained. The overrides include two bills related to abortion and legislation related to woman sports, woman's bill of rights, school field trips, childcare subsidies, jail statutes and human smuggling.

Comprehensive tax policy reform will not move forward after the veto and failed override of the SB 169 conference committee report. This is the bill aiming to restructure state income tax rates to a single flat tax rate of 5.15%, expand exemptions for social security income, and accelerate the state sales tax phase-out for food and food ingredients to zero percent as of January 1, 2024.

As the dust cleared, the session saw 800 bills introduced with 98 signed into law by Governor Kelly, becoming law without her signature or a veto override. All remaining legislation, still alive, will become active for consideration next January.

## **Water Policy & Funding**

The session produced incredible progress for water funding as Governor Kelly signed the HB 2302 conference committee report into law, cementing the Legislature's historic funding boost to the state water plan fund.

HB 2279, related to groundwater management district reporting requirements, SB 205, pertaining to certain water rights in multi-year flex accounts, and SB 120, dealing with the Kansas water pollution control revolving fund, are now signed into law.

Though the 2023 session tackled many water policy and funding issues, plenty of new ideas are expected to be introduced next session.

## **Transportation Policy & Funding**

The Legislature's approved budget marked a second year of state highway fund funding without extraordinary transfers. In addition, the budget adds support for a \$220M commitment over four years from the state general fund to the infrastructure leveraging fund to assist local governments in matching federal funds.

The stalled comprehensive tax package (SB 169 conference committee report) proactively had a positive adjustment of the state sales tax rate the state highway fund and also did not impact the local governments share of sales tax. Since there will be no changes to law for the sales tax rates related to food, there will be no implications to the state highway fund's share of the state sales tax.
