

Sustainable Infrastructure Committee Report

Self-de-icing LED Signals

Technical Summary for the Kanas Department of Transportation (KDOT) Research on Self-de-icing LED Signals can be found at: https://www.ksdot.gov/Assets/wwwksdotorg/bureaus/KdotLib/2022/FHWA-KS-22-04 Summary.pdf

The KDOT Pooled Fund project aimed at developing and demonstrating a new type of self-de-icing of LED signals using the existing energy typically lost off the back of the system.

First Stage of Testing – focused on laboratory development and testing to enhance the heating and lighting performance while reducing costs.

Second Stage of Testing – was conducted on the roof of the University of Kansas engineering complex with a focus on closed-course performance and reliability tests of new signals using real traffic signal cabinets. Based on the test results, new plastic housing with needed modifications were tested in the laboratory then again on the roof with satisfactory performance.



Third Stage of Testing – involved an initial field test site in Lawrence, KS on a signal facing north. Two additional field tests were conducted in Michigan and Wisconsin in November 2021.

In conclusion, it is apparent that with some modifications to the design of signal modules that the existing energy can be redirected to keep snow and ice from covering the signal indications and improve safety for maintenance workers and the traveling public while also providing a needed sustainable solution to a common problem.

Ed was actively involved in APWA and served as the KC Metro Chapter's President in 1994 and in ACEC rising to the position of National President.




KC APWA chapter members shared the following tributes on Ed:


